
Outline: I. The psalmist claims relationship to Yahweh, as his Shepherd v. 1

II. He recounts his experiences Yahweh had done as his Shepherd vv. 2-5

III. He infers that Yahweh will never leave nor forsake him. v. 6

A shepherd, as described in the Bible, often meant a king, a civil, or spiritual leader. Joshua is an example of a civil leader, called a shepherd. (Num, 27:14) As we read Psalm 23, and compare it with Ezekiel 34, we will discover God's definitions of a good shepherd vs. an unfaithful shepherd.

23 1 A Psalm of David. The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.



The Prophecy Against the Unfaithful Shepherds of Israel -

Ezekiel 34 Message Bible (MSG)
34 1 And the word of the Lord came to me, saying, 2 "Son of man, prophesy against the shepherds of Israel, prophesy and say to them, 'Thus says the Lord God to the shepherds: "Woe to the shepherds of Israel who feed themselves! Should not the shepherds feed the flocks?"

Psalm 23:2 NKJV

He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters.

Ezekiel 34:14 Message Bible
14 I'll lead them into lush pasture
so they can roam the mountain
pastures of Israel, graze at leisure,
feed in the rich pastures on the
mountains of Israel.

What are the shepherds doing wrong?

Many of Israel's shepherds ruled with cruelty and force. In verses 3-4, God gives a list of accusation against the shepherds. In other words, the king, civil leader, or priests made a good life for themselves from the flock without feeding them and ruling them with cruelty and force.

Ezekiel 34:3-4

- You eat the fat and clothe yourselves with the wool;
- you slaughter the fatlings, but you do not feed the flock.
- The weak you have not strengthened,
- nor have you healed those who were sick,
- nor bound up the broken,
- nor brought back what was driven away,
- nor sought what was lost; but with force and cruelty you have ruled

Psalm 23:3 NKJV

3 He restores my soul; He leads me in the paths of righteousness For His name's sake.

How is the soul restored and from what does it need restoring?


The original Hebrew words which are translated, "He restores my soul", are "nafshi yeshobeb." Nafshi is from the word, "nephesh" (Strong's 5315) and means, "myself / soul / person / life." The second word, "yeshobeb" is a form of "shub" (Strong's 7725), the Hebrew word for repentance (to turn back, to return). From the translation of these two Hebrew words, Psalm 23:3 could easily be translated, "He brings me back", or "He causes me to repent".

"He refreshes my soul" When weary, in trouble, sickness, discouraged, or facing opposition by faith, I believe God by means of his Word refreshes us; He refreshes our soul. (Psalm 19:7)

Psalm 23:4 NKJV 4a. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil:

4b. For You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me.

The Good Shepherd In biblical times, a shepherd's main concern was the welfare of the flock. Providing the sheep with food and water well as quarding them from predators and thieves were primary responsibilities. Highlighting this relationship, Jes says in the scripture, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep." John 10:11



Ezekiel 34:5-6 The Message (MSG) 5 So they were scattered because there was no shepherd, and when they were scattered they became food for all the wild animals.
6 My sheep wandered through all the mountains, and on every high hill; yes, My flock was scattered over the whole face of the earth, and no one was seeking or

searching for them."

How does God then react to such negligence? He says that he's against those shepherds, and He demands His sheep from them. He calls those shepherds to account. He sets himself in opposition to them. He's not going to allow His sheep to endure that kind of treatment from negligent and domineering undershepherds.

Ezekiel 34:10 - The Message (MSG) "'Watch out! I'm coming down on the shepherds and taking my sheep back. They're fired as shepherds of my sheep. No more shepherds who just feed themselves! I'll rescue my sheep from their greed. They're not going to feed off my sheep any longer!

Psalm 23:5 NKJV

5 You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You anoint my head with oil; My cup runs over.

"You prepare" comes from the Hebrew word אַעֶרֹף ta-'ă-rōk, (Strong's 6186), which could also be translated 'you arrange'. I love the idea of God arranging things for me.

During the summer, pesky "nasal flies" swarm the flock and lay eggs on the sheep's noses. When tiny worms hatch from the eggs, they wiggle up inside the nose. Terrible itching drives the sheep crazy. They shake their heads and stamp their feet to escape the flies.

How is the soul restored and from what does it need restoring?

At the first sign of flies, the shepherd pours a sticky mixture of oil on each sheep's nose and head. Immediately, the sheep settle down. Holy Spirit has this affect upon us, when we get upset and troubled; we ask for His help and He calms us down. Ezekiel 34:20-22. (MSG)
20-22 "Therefore, God, the Master, says:
I myself am stepping in and making
things right between the plump sheep
and the skinny sheep. Because you
forced your way with shoulder and rump
and butted at all the weaker animals with
your horns till you scattered them all
over the hills, I'll come in and save my
dear flock, no longer let them be

pushed around. I'll step in and set

things right between one sheep and

Gly Good Shepherd pours oil on my head, removing irritations from me before I go and do something foolish.
